THREE ONE-WEEK SESSIONS

MONDAY - FRIDAY, 9 A.M. TO 3:00 P.M.

Welcome to our fourth season of the Turtle Island Summer Camp at Hilltop Hanover Farm in Yorktown! After many years of conducting educational programs and projects for children outdoors in nature and indoors in schools, the team of Something Good in the World educators is proud to offer three weeks of summer activities for children of all ages. In addition to a highly experienced staff, Turtle Island Summer Camp brings talented visiting educators to share their professional expertise with children in the areas of Art, Design, Handicrafts, Music, Movement, Theatre, Farming, Wilderness Skills, and much more. Each week has a different theme, and yet all are interconnected, allowing children the opportunity to build on what they are learning if they are able to attend all summer long, or to focus in on one particular area if they come for one week.

Registration

Camp is open for registration to children in two age groups: 3 and 4 year olds in the mornings from 9:00 a.m. to 12 noon, and full days of 9:00 a.m. to 3 p.m. for ages 5 to 12 (5 year olds need to have completed at least one year of full-day kindergarten or pre-school in order to attend). There are three one-week sessions, which begin Monday, July 5 and end on Friday, July 23.

Location

SGITW is a "farm partner" at Hilltop Hanover Farm and Environmental Center, which is owned and operated

by Westchester County. The mission of the farm is to preserve open space, protect drinking water and promote environmental education. SGITW works in cooperation with Westchester County to meet these goals. Hilltop Hanover Farm offers a unique setting for a summer camp in that all of our time is spent outdoors in nature. Our base camp area is "The Children's Peaceful Garden," which was designed and created by and for children. This is where we start and close each day, and is the site of many of our art projects. We have an indoor Children's Environmental Education Center that allows us to work safely sheltered in the event of rain, and miles of paths to hike and explore, woods and streams to cool off in, and large open fields for group activities. Children are sure to find their own special places to enjoy in the great outdoors, and each day we will look for opportunities for quiet time to be spent in the natural wonder of the landscape.

Philosophy

Behind all the work we do, the educational staff of Something Good in the World is dedicated to promoting as many varied arts and skills as possible inside of

the natural surroundings of this extraordinary 183-acre facility. Our educational philosophy encourages individuality and creativity, with each child's unique contribution adding to the cohesion of all. Games and exercises are designed to promote teamwork and cooperation, rather than competition. Art projects focus on the process, more than on the result. All around, sensory, hands-on experience is the approach for all of our educational programs.



Weekly Activities

In addition to the theme-related activities for the session, each week will include hiking on miles of trails; walking the creek in the shady woods; daily farm chores such as composting, planting, weeding, harvesting, and animal care; farm and nature-based arts and crafts projects; learning about alternative energy systems that use solar, wind, water, and kid-power as renewable resources; free time for games and personal projects, creative play in the "Children's Peaceful Garden," and plenty of time to enjoy the outdoors.

While all the children will get to spend free time together, the youngest children (3-4 year olds) will tend to work together in their own Yellow Group in the mornings. The older children will often have activities in one large group, but for some projects they will divide into the Turquoise Group (8-12 year olds) and the Purple Group (5-7 year olds). Every effort will be made to keep friends and siblings together when requested.

The Educational Staff

The educators of Something Good in the World come from a high level of professionalism and dedication to children's education, with a firm belief in providing a safe environment where a child's individuality and natural talents can be promoted. Educational Program Director Barbara Sarbin has an extensive background in children's education. Barbara is known for her ongoing "Earth School" programs at Hilltop Hanover Farm for homeschoolers, as well as her workshops as an artist-in-residence for Westchester public schools, and her directorship of



the Turtle Island Summer Camp for the past three years. This summer's staff also includes: Kani Bynoe and Holly Stagliano, whose expertise is in teaching Pre-School through Kindergarten;

Margaret von der Meden who is well-known for her skills in Farm Handicrafts; William Giese, whose training is in the Fine Arts; Vince Walsh of the Kawing Crow Awareness Center, who is an expert in Wilderness Skills and Animal Tracking, and this year we welcome Paul and Melanie Zeir of Talking Hands Talking Feet, whose talents are brought alive through music and movement theater programs for children.

WEEK ONE

Home Planet Wonder
July 5 - 9

The natural wonders of music, dance, story-telling and theater come alive in this week's exploration of the interplay between the human and nature. Each day will spiral through a different aspect of nature's living systems, using dynamic rhythm training, improvisation, forays into songs and stories, ensemble music theater, and an exploration of music and dance in relation to the planet and her many peoples. The week will conclude with a special performance for families and friends, woven together from the song and story threads of our Turtle Island experience.

WEEK TWO

Living with the Land
July 12 - 16

This week will explore ancient knowledge of Wilderness Skills, based on many Native American traditions of the Northeast, such as animal tracking, shelter construction, fire building, sensory awareness, woodland crafts, teamwork games, story-telling, and much more. These skills will help us to see how living in balance and harmony with our environment means "walking lightly on the Earth." On the last day of this session, there will be a short presentation and an exhibit of the children's crafts.

WEEK THREE

Creative Arts and Design in Nature
July 19 - 23



The focus of this session is on the process of creating multiple forms of art, by drawing inspiration from what we find on the farm and in nature. Children will have the opportunity to explore and experiment with multiple kinds of self-expression, learn new skills, and grow confidence in their abilities, through a wide range of artistic media: clay, sculpture, drawing, painting, collage, printing, casting, rubbing, and photography. On the last day of the week, parents will be invited to an art show, to see some of the tangible results of the children's experiences.

There will be ongoing activities throughout the two days that all ages can help out with, such as preparing the soil and planting of native plants, flowers, herbs, and organic vegetables in and around the Children's Peaceful Garden. Families are welcome to come and hike the trails and become more familiar with the Hilltop Hanover Farm landscape.
